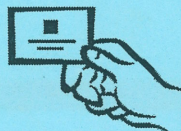
## LEGAL AID CLINIC INFORMATION

- ◆ **Please bring any court documents related to your case, if you have any.**
- ◆ Please know that the number of clients seen at each clinic varies depending on our volunteer attorneys' availability.
- ◆ Once clinic starts, you will undergo a preliminary screening to determine eligibility for our services.
- ◆ Upon qualification, you will be scheduled to meet with a staff or volunteer attorney.
- ◆ If documents are to be prepared at our office, you should expect them to be ready in 2-4 weeks.
- ◆ Although we make every effort to assist in a timely manner, please know that every case is different, time varies.
- ◆ We do not have childcare services, please do not bring small children.

We strongly recommend that you call in advance to ensure you have a legal matter with which we can assist, before going to clinic.

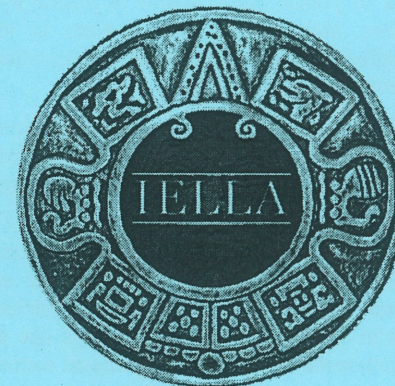

## EXPUNGEMENTS

An **expungement** reopens your criminal case, dismisses and sets aside the conviction, and re-closes the case without a conviction. In effect, you are no longer a convicted person. However the case record itself will still exist, and the expungement will appear on your record.

If you plan on attending our clinic you **MUST** bring your **complete case print-out** for each conviction. You can obtain this document from the Clerk's Office at the court where you received your conviction.

## TEN PRINCIPLES OF ACTION

- 1 To develop a national movement of formerly-incarcerated people and people with past convictions so we can build political power for our communities.
- 2 To eliminate the lifelong punishment resulting from past convictions or imprisonment. To achieve full restoration of the rights of formerly-incarcerated/convicted people.
- 3 To advocate for the human rights of currently and formerly-incarcerated persons.
- 4 To effectively advocate for alternatives to incarceration, both for young people and for adults - To encourage mother and child alternatives to incarceration for women.
- 5 To stop the expansion of the Prison Industrial Complex.
- 6 To implement a Bill of Rights that will guarantee prison visiting rights, stop the exploitation of prisoners' labor, stop corporate profiteering from prison telephone surcharges, ensure quality medical care for prisoners, end fast-track adoptions, end all forms of discrimination based on past convictions, and stop the deportation of juveniles and parents away from their families.
- 7 To encourage change in government policy in order to make enough resources available to ensure the greatest likelihood of success for people coming out of prison.
- 8 To stop politicians and others from using crime rates and parole violations to advance their careers.
- 9 To overcome the stigma and change public perception of who we are; to show our successes instead of allowing the media and others to focus only on our failures.
- 10 To overcome the fear and heal the shame associated with being a convicted felon or former prisoner.

- Are you currently on probation or parole?
- Are you having a hard time starting over?
- Have you applied for job after job and been denied?
- Have you or someone you know been denied housing or welfare due to an arrest?
- Would you like to know more about your voting rights?
- Have you been denied custody of your children because of your arrest or conviction?
- Has your juvenile record been used against you?

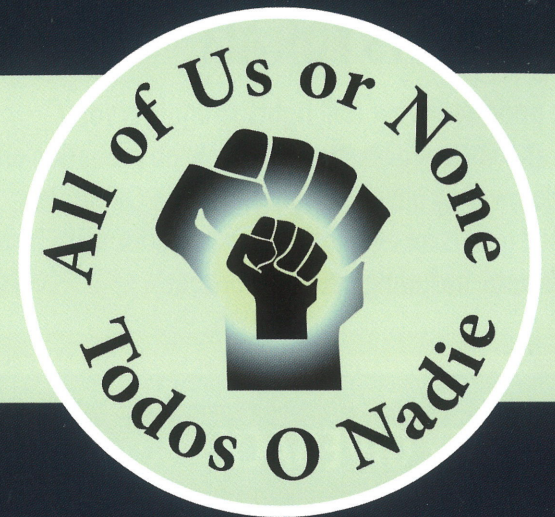

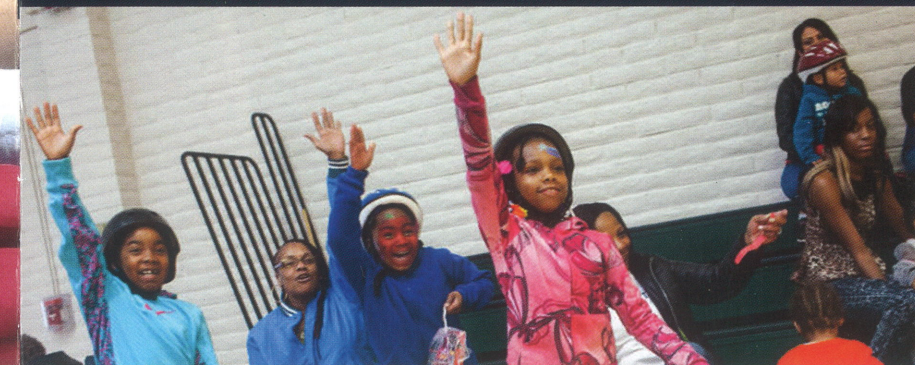

## WHO IS ALL OF US OR NONE?

All of Us or None, a project of Legal Services for Prisoners with Children, is an organizing initiative started by people who have been incarcerated, to challenge the pervasive discrimination that currently and formerly-incarcerated people, and our family members face. Our goal is to strengthen the voices, visibility, and leadership of people most affected by the judicial system and the growth of the prison-industrial complex. Through our grassroots organizing, we are building a powerful political movement to win the full restoration of our civil and human rights.

## VOTING RIGHTS FOR ALL

One of the priorities in our civil rights struggle is voter education and voter registration so people on probation and off parole know they have the right to vote in California. Our eventual goal is for everyone living in California to have the right to vote, including people in prison.

## COMMUNITY GIVEBACK

This annual event is supported 100% by individual donations and volunteer labor.

Formerly-incarcerated people give bikes and other toys to children whose parents are currently incarcerated. The event demonstrates one of the ways formerly-incarcerated people give back to our communities. AOUON members are the vehicle to deliver these new bicycles from incarcerated parents to their children during the holiday season.



## CLEAN SLATE (Prop 47)

California law allows for dismissal of certain criminal convictions and outlines a process for applying for criminal rehabilitation or pardon. The California Clean Slate campaign works with legal advocates, service providers, and community activists to expand access to these services.

## CURRENT CAMPAIGNS

### BAN THE BOX

Our "Ban the Box" campaign calls for employers and housing providers to reduce the number of jobs and housing requiring background checks, eliminate questions about past convictions on applications, and other changes in hiring policy and housing. This campaign targets and challenges the structural discrimination inherent in requiring that people disclose past convictions on applications for employment, housing, social services, insurance, college admission, and loans.

## CHAPTERS

All of Us or None is a network of chapters and associated ally organizations. The national base is located in the Bay Area in California. We also have chapters in Sacramento, East Palo Alto, Los Angeles, Riverside, Texas, and North Carolina. Any organization is welcome to join our network if they agree with our code of conduct, principles of action, and our self-determination pledge, and want to participate in our campaigns.

## SELF-DETERMINATION PLEDGE

- To demand the right to speak in our own voices.
- To treat each other with respect and not allow differences to divide us.
- To accept responsibility for any acts that may have caused harm to our families, our communities, or ourselves.
- To fight all forms of discrimination.
- To help build the economic stability of formerly-incarcerated people.
- To claim and take care of our own children and our families.
- To support community struggles to stop using prisons as the answer to social problems.
- To play an active role in making our communities safe for everyone.

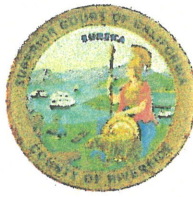

The Family Law Facilitator is an attorney with experience in family law matters and who provides free assistance to unrepresented litigants regarding petitions, responses, child support services inquiries, child and spousal support calculations, motions, and general family law questions. The Facilitator can help you in preparing your forms and can give you general information, but they cannot go with you to court.

The Family Law Facilitator is NOT an employee of the Department of Child Support Services.

The Family Law Facilitator is not your lawyer, but a neutral person who does not represent any party. There is no attorney-client relationship between you and the Facilitator. Communications between you and the Facilitator are not confidential. You should consult with your own attorney if you want personalized legal advice or strategy, have a confidential conversation, or be represented by an attorney in court.

The Family Law Facilitator is not responsible for the outcome of your case.

The Family Law Facilitator is available to meet with litigants on a first come, first served basis, during regular operating hours.

While visiting the Family Law Facilitator, it is recommended that your children be left with an appropriate childcare provider.

### NEED A DCSS SIGNATURE ON THE JUDGMENT?

If you need DCSS to sign your Family Law Judgment, an attorney from DCSS will be available on Tuesday's and Thursday's from 1:30 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. and on Fridays from 8:30 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. at the Customer Service Center.

PRIOR TO SUBMITTING YOUR JUDGMENT TO DCSS. Please visit the Family Law Facilitator at their location at the 2081 building for review of your paperwork.
